Our 'Honorary Marine', Mae Burke, W3CUL, last month received recognition for a job WELL DONE. With all of Mac's activities in the Amateur Radio Traffic business, it's a little difficult to say in a few words just how valuable she has been to Marine Corps personnel and their dependents.

Briefly, over a period of seven years, Mae has handled something like 350,000 pieces of traffic on the amateur bands. Of this, an estimated 315,000 were for marines. Believe me, that's a lot of traffic...

Mae and the OM, Al W3VR, have an installation valued at about \$6,000.00. And with the above totals, it appears to have been set up primarily to handle USMC messages. This, in itself, is an item worthy of several bouquets.

We've only had the pleasure of running traffic sessions with Mae since 1962, but it only took a few minutes on our first contact to realize that here's a gal that really knows the radio business. And it's always most enjoyable to hear her voice, efficiently getting that message to it's destination in a hurry. Even with schedules running ten hours daily, and more, Mae always has time for a friendly chat with the group on freq.
