I see you are hard pressed for in-dividual station items to date but things will improve as the monthly issues are run by. We were joking by saying that ZERO BEAT was the Marine Corps edition of PLAYBOY magazine. HI!

I would send along my station report, but I doubt if anyone in his right mind would be interested. There are some things I would be interested in knowing; such as, who are the CHOPS operating the various 602 stations at present. What type of equipment is being used and what problems have they run into on the circuits?

If you can promote questions in your editorial then you may come up with more informative articles, as in-formation or rebuttal. I do have some- thing to submit that may be very time-ly, but does not affect the military to any great extent.

Attached (will publish later,..ed) is a copy of the Internal Revenue Service Bulletin 67-43. This covers some good news as MARS members. You will note that Navy MARS is not mentioned but I have been assured that by intent it does include us. With tax time coming up thought it would be of some interest for your readers, Every little bit helps.

An important note: you must have paid bills in hand to substantiate any out-of-pocket expenses in order to take these deductions. At least, if you can not do it this year, there is always next year.

The station has been moved and ex- panded to include an addition to our model 19, a model 14 (100WPM), a model 28KSR (100WPM), and a kleinschmitt T D

(100-75-60 WPM) transmit only. All are tied into a home-brew patch panel and two positions can be operated simultaneously. We have FSK and AFSK circuits, one HT-37 XMTR, one SR-42 transcvr, the SP-600 and SX-111 receivers all tied in to the patch. Now all we need is a little more traffic to keep the cobwebs out of the system. Hi!!

We learn from Bill Biggs (SSgt) soon to be CHOP of N0FAA/W4LEV that they have quite an antenna system there at Camp Lejeune. They have on test from Collins Radio, a 6.5 to 30 MHz log periodic. The antenna is a monster with a 65 foot boom mounted on a fifty foot tower. The entire tower pole rotates and the array has a reported 20 db gain over a dipole. N0FAA/W4LEV has been using it on their Navy MARS sked with N0FJM/KG4AM at Gitmo on 16.300 MHz with very good results. Bill says that it works like a charm on 6970 KHz..... Sounds beautiful Bill...Good luck in the future with this antenna.

We learn from SSgt Henry D. Rhodes that WA6CLH at Base Special Services Hobby Shop, Camp Pendleton, is active and running patches with KR6DI on 21425 Kc. I am honored to have been asked by the managing editor to make a small monthly contribution to ZERO BEAT. It will be my endeavor to furnish you with useful information and items of interest on an unofficial, informal basis, that would not otherwise warrant official publication. Individual requests for information may be addressed to the managing editor of ZERO BEAT and will be promptly answered in this column.

Although I enjoy the privilege of knowing many of you personally, I shall take this opportunity to introduce myself to those of you who may have here-to-fore eluded this dubious pleasure.

The official nomenclature is as follows: Warrant Officer Joseph A. Van Brocklin 099477/2805, USMC. I am the Navy MARS Liaison Officer on the staff of the Commandant of the Marine Corps (Code DSB).

To spare yea the boring details of my military career, suffice it to say that I have enjoyed the usual conglomeration of duty assignments since January 1947, including sea, air, and infantry, independent type duty and Vietnam, which seemed to be a combination of all these. In fact, a dim recollection of once having, worn a uniform other than that of the "Marine Green" still lingers. Primary Military Occupational Specialties (MOS) previously held include the followings 2531, 2619, 2771, 2533, 2539, 2529 and 2861.

Since joining the ranks of amateur radio as WA2FQS in 1959, it has been my privilege to have served as CHOP of

both KR6GF and W4PFC. My experience in Navy MARS started with the inception of Navy MARS, involved the establishment of MARS in Vietnam, and since 21 November 1966, has dealt with the birth and nurture of the official MARS program within the Marine Corps. May I never see another set of orders!

Now to the matter of promulgating information. All, CONDS MARS billets have been established and included in the revised T/O for the appropriate command. All overseas MARS billets have been established and will be included in the fourth quarter (April 1968) manning authorizations.

The last word on MOS 8981, MARS Radio Operator, was that it has been included in change 24 to the MOS manual, effective 1 February 1968. Printing of change 24 is lagging somewhat and may not hit the field until late February. Slippage of the effective date could occur, in which case the effective date would be 1 March 1968. Action has been initiated to assign the MOS level with notification of assignment to the field for entry in the SRB. Change 24 will also authorize the assignment at the local command level and entry in the SRB. Assignment will be made to those qualified by virtue of possessing an FCC amateur radio license of Conditional Class or higher, regardless of primary MOS. Assignment of personnel possessing a secondary 8981 into the MARS program. will also be made without regard to primary MOS insofar as it is practical to the critical needs of the Marine Corps. More on this as developments occur.

Not wanting to offend anyone with my greeting. I might explain that I really do not consider any of you to be "Hams" or "Martians" Ham can be cured and a green suit doesn't make a little green man!

Station Of The Month: NOASM/W4NTR.....

The station here at Headquarters Bn, HQMC has come a long way in the last year. With the help and support of Special Services, the command and individuals, the station now has a new and bigger location and beautiful new equipment.

In the summer of 1967, the station was moved from building one to its present location in building nineteen with Special Services. Building one was always a problem location because of the court room and other activities. Many times operations at the station had to cease because the court room was using tape recorders and W4NTR was on the tape. Also the operating room was very small and there was room for only one small position.

W4NTR/NOASM now is a two position station with two S lines. At the present time one position has a Henry Four K, while the other has a 30S-1. Both positions have their own 13 to 30 log periodic antenna up sixty feet. One 18 HT serves two positions for frequencies below 13 MHz. Between the two positions is an eight foot rack containing the following equipments one speaker, one URA 8A TTY converter-comparator group, two FRR 23 receivers,, one audio patch panel, one SP 600 receiver, two TK-100 and two SB 1203 TTY patch panels.

The teletype equipment includes: one UGC 6 (model 28 ASR) at 100 WPM including typing reperforator, one TT47 at 100 WPM (model 28 KSR) normalled in to NAV, one UGC 5 at 100 WPM (model 28 ASR), one AN/FGC-9 at 60 WPM (model 19) with model 14 typing reperforator, and two RT28 typing reperforator transmitter distributors at 100 WPM mounted in a common cabinet. One of the RT-28 reperforators is normalled into NAV with its motor controlled by the TT-47.


All of the teletype equipment is brought to the patching panels, SB 1203s, on the equipment rack. There are eight separate 60 MA station loops and one line to NAV on the SB 1203's.

The station has great versatility and was constructed with this in mind. All audio in the station including telephone lines are brought to one patch panel. This together with the TTY patch panel makes the following operations possible: voice or TTY retransmission, TTY space diversity reception, TTY frequency diversity reception, retransmission to a telephone line, simultaneous transmission on two frequencies and remote voice operation of either position.

NOASM became NAV 2 (operational sign only) a number of months ago and is now listed in ACP 100, which means NAV 2 is a recognized naval comm station and can check into military circuits if necessary.

Four operators man NAV 2/W4NTR at the present time. One operator, GySgt Bill Tweed has been working at the station since early Dec 67 and will be leaving the end of Feb. His help has certainly been appreciated in the short time he has been at the station. Bill has been an amateur since 1953 and now holds the call K6RTP. He has worked at W6ZJB, KR6CP, KR6MD and KR6GF. He was amateur coordinator for Okinawa in 61-3. Bill will be missed when he leaves the end of the month.

The CHOP of the station is GySgt Wes Wilson, He has been at the station since Sept 67. Wes has been an active amateur since 51 and a Navy MASS member since 63. He now holds WA6UGG/NOAGA, Wes has worked at KH6BGS, W6IAB and.....


